The Opportunity

Across the country, women are searching for places where they can be seen, healed, and spiritually formed.

Many pastors long to shepherd these women well, yet they are increasingly navigating complex emotional, relational, and spiritual needs without practical, trauma-aware resources.

I believe one of the greatest opportunities before the Church is to strengthen both women and the shepherds who care for them.

Why This Work

Togetherness Project is a registered 501(c)(3) nonprofit dedicated to cultivating a culture of soul care through discipleship, coaching, teaching, and ministry resources. For nearly two decades, I have walked alongside women through betrayal, addiction recovery, incarceration, grief, relational trauma, and spiritual formation. Again and again, I have witnessed the same reality: women long to be seen, and pastors long to shepherd them well.

Those experiences became the foundation of Togetherness Project and the Soul Care Resource Library—a long-term initiative designed to strengthen women, equip pastors, and help local churches flourish through biblically faithful, trauma-aware discipleship resources

The Vision

The Soul Care Resource Library will initially include fifteen core resources.

The first three resources are written for women, creating a pathway from restoration to spiritual maturity, healthy relationships, and wholehearted discipleship.

The remaining twelve resources are written for pastors and church leaders, equipping them with practical theological frameworks, soul care language, and collaborative tools to shepherd women with wisdom, tenderness, and sustainable care.

Together, these resources are designed to become books, study guides, small-group curriculum, pastoral training tools, recovery ministry resources, and discipleship pathways that strengthen churches for generations. By equipping local churches rather than replacing them, the Soul Care Resource Library is

designed to multiply its impact through the people and ministries already serving communities every day. **This five-year initiative is a long-term investment in helping local churches become places of healing, discipleship, and flourishing.**

Why This Matters

When women heal . . . families become healthier. When pastors are strengthened . . . churches flourish. When churches become places of safety, truth, and belonging . . . the Gospel becomes more visible.

Evidence the Vision is Already Bearing Fruit

This vision is already taking root.

- *Grit & Grace* has been published and is already being used in women's discipleship groups.
- Women recovering from addiction and incarceration are completing the material through ministries such as the Lovelady Center and The Foundry.
- Additional groups are launching in churches and ministry settings.
- Beginning graduate theological studies at Beeson Divinity School to deepen the biblical and theological foundation of this work.
- Building a collaborative network of pastors, theologians, and ministry leaders who will help shape the pastoral series.

Seeking Kingdom Partners
